From the President of the

The Tlell Fall Fair Board humbly thanks all those who made the 2025 Fall Fair success. To many people who attend the Fair, it is a one-day event. That is how it appears. Yes, we have our big day, the day with the food, games, exhibits and of course our live music, but the day before is also an important day and is in fact what makes us a Fair.

The Saturday is when most of the exhibits arrive at the fairgrounds and get judged at a provincial judging standard. We have our volunteer category coordinators and judges review all of the exhibits and award scores to each item. If the items meet the scoring standards and criteria, they are given a first, second or third ribbon. Once all the items are judged in each category then the score for each item from each exhibitor is added together and the exhibitor with the most points win the first prize, second most point for second prize and then the same for the third place. Only two categories are not judged the day before, Livestock and Poultry. They are judged the morning of the fair and the same process is followed. That is pretty much it for the judging side of the fair.

There is something else many people don't know. The Tlell Fall Fair is part of the Graham Island East Coast Farmers Institute. The Institute is based in Tlell and has had members from most parts of the islands for over 100 years. The original base of the Institute was in Lawnhill and that is where they held the original Fall Fairs.

We want to thank all the volunteers who have put in so much hard work over the years to keep the Fall Fair going. You are the lifeblood of the event. Without you, we could not get ready for the Fair. We are always looking for more volunteers to help with the organizing, setup and operation of the fair. New ideas are always welcome. Last but certainly not least, to all of the Donators, Supporters and Exhibitors of the fair. Without you we couldn't keep the fair operational.

The Tlell Fall Fair is all about Agriculture and everything involved with it. We are not just about winning prizes, ribbons and showing off what your garden can produce, or how ornate you made your last quilt. It is about sharing knowledge of how you got your garden to thrive, about becoming more sustainable, producing our own natural healthy food. It is spreading the knowhow of making it yourself. The Fair is a small part of the Agricultural community on Haida Gwaii, and through our parent organization, the Graham Island East Coast Farmers Institute, we are an integral part.

Agriculture is one of the fastest growing (Pun intended) lifestyle and business happenings on Haida Gwaii. This is evident by the number of vendors and patrons at the Farmers Markets on Haida Gwaii. Some of those Market vendors will also be at this year's Fall Fair. The Tlell Farmer's Market will be set up at the fair to provide the attendees with all their fine products.

If you are wondering, and I know some are, this year's Fair Theme is “Birds of a Feather”. So, what can you think of for your exhibits that represent the theme. Let see what you come up with. So, with the theme in mind, everyone should “Flock” to the Fair and make it another success. See you at the Tlell Fall Fair.

TLELL FALL FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Exhibits are at owner's risk, and the Fair Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage.**
- 2. The Fair Committee reserves the right to refuse any exhibit that is incorrectly entered or does not conform to these rules and regulations.**
- 3. Exhibits shall bear no ownership identification other than the entry ticket provided.**
- 4. Exhibits must conform to the description in the entry book in regard to quantity.**
- 5. Each exhibitor may enter as many sections per class as desired but only one entry per section, except in Livestock and Poultry where each exhibitor may enter a maximum of two entries per person.**
- 6. Exhibits must be grown or crafted by the exhibitor in the previous twelve months unless never before entered in any form of competition.**
- 7. Only one name per exhibitor number.**
- 8. No exhibitors are allowed in the Exhibit Area until judging is completed.**
- 9. A "For Sale" sign may be attached after the judging is completed. Article or item may not be removed until after 5:00 p.m. on Fair Day.**
- 10. Articles not mentioned in the Entry Booklet may be titled "Display Only" and will not be judged.**
- 11. No dogs allowed on the exhibition grounds. NO EXCEPTIONS.**
- 12. Any person earning more than 50% of their annual income from a specific art or craft will be considered a professional and not eligible to compete in that particular art or craft.**

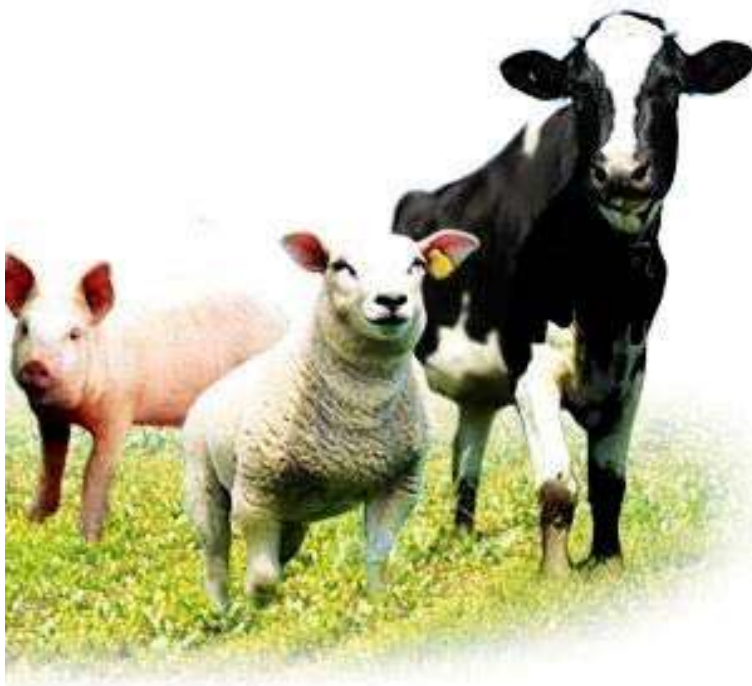

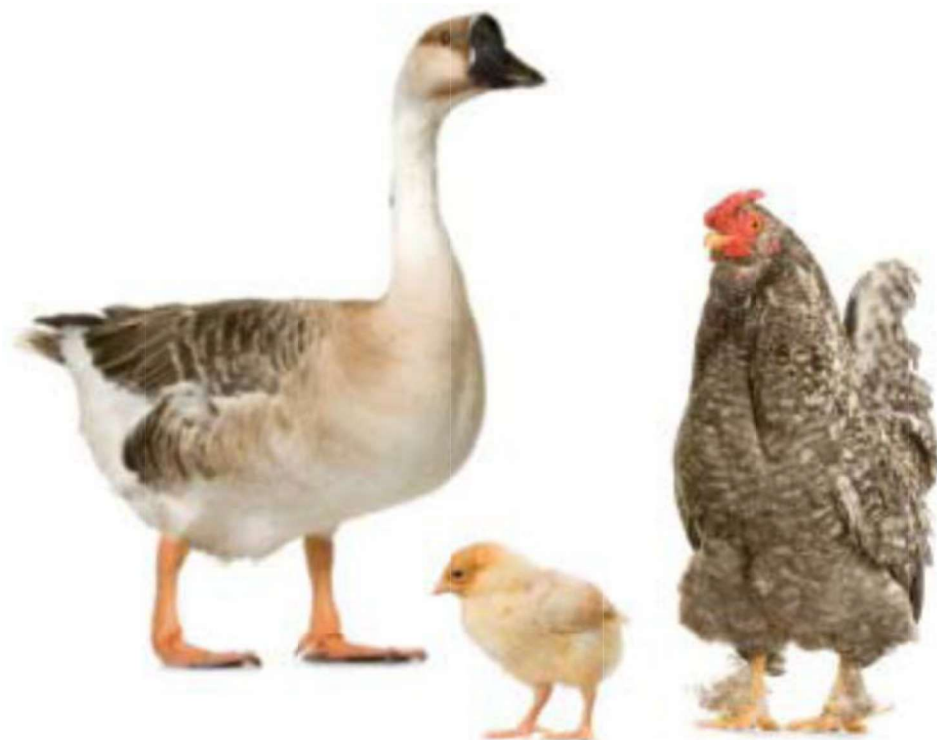
